We are nearly there....

So, how is your Lent going?! Great, or not so great? Feeling like it is a long way to Holy Week, or has it flown by so far?

Has Lent felt like a complete disaster so far? Are you feeling a bit sick of it all?! If your Lent has stalled - did you start with plans that were a bit too much perhaps? I know of three vicars that boldly told the whole of Facebook they were coming off it for Lent only for them to sheepishly say it was too hard and they're all back on it now!



If this is how you are feeling too, fear not. I am going to share with you some suggestions to help us re-engage with Lent this year.

Firstly, we can practice what is called 'Gratitude in the Moment'.

Whenever I want to start over anything, I often think: "I'll start over later, tomorrow, when I've got time to sit down and take stock and then I will begin again." Inevitably, that moment never comes because I don't make it happen. I don't start over in the heat of the battle. So the battle never ends.

If you feel like you're drifting through Lent right now, please don't wait for the perfect time to restart. It won't happen- there isn't a perfect time. So wherever you are, stop, give yourself a few spare minutes, and thank God for, say, ten things about your day or your life right now. Gratitude can help us turn our hearts back to God when we don't know where else to begin

Secondly, we could ask ourselves what we have learnt so far this Lent.

When the road ahead looks long, it's easy to forget how far we have already come. So we can ask ourselves, what have we learnt so far this Lent? If the answer is 'nothing': maybe we need to ask ourselves again! It doesn't have to be anything specifically Lent related.

Maybe God has been working in our lives in a way we didn't at first realise? Maybe there is something nagging us in the back of our mind that God wants us to look at? Or perhaps we have learnt something through what we have given up, or taken up, that has surprised us? If we just take a few moments to remind ourselves why we started what we started, and rejoice in what we have learnt so far - even if it is only in the really little things!

The third suggestion would be to give ourselves a some time in a 'retreat'.

Now we may not have the luxury of being able to go away on an actual retreat between now and Easter, but is there a day, half day, or even just an

evening between now and then that we could turn into a mini retreat for ourselves?

If we have a really busy lifestyle, this may not be possible- but you might wish to include partners and family in your retreat plans too.

Ideas could include: a special visit to a new church or the Cathedral in Llandaff, going on a walk, writing our thoughts down, journaling, art, reading the Sunday gospel, spending some time in silence, and of course, in prayer. Perhaps we could intentionally put all the distractions (TV, radio, internet, phone, music etc) away for a set period of time and enter into some quality time with God.

My fourth suggestion would be that if we didn't start Lent with a plan, perhaps we could make one now!

Lent isn't meant to be a competition of who can give up the most, or be the most holy. It is meant to be a time of renewal, of clearing out the junk in our lives and letting Springtime enter our hearts, but let's also not forget that it is a time of friendship, of walking with Christ through his time in the desert. So when I say, 'make a plan' I don't mean, sit down and work out how you can cram in everything in the next few weeks. Instead, ask yourself - how can I plan my day so that there is a way I can best grow in time spent with Christ?

And finally, we could just walk quietly and humbly with our God...

As we get ever nearer to Holy Week, we need to remember that God wants us as much as we want Him. As good and wonderful as all the extra things we may be doing or giving up for Lent are, we need to remember to get to the heart of what this means for us personally. Perhaps we can focus our bible reading from now on in on the Gospel passages of Christ's return to Jerusalem, the Last Supper and the Way of the Cross, or maybe we can look at the Holy Week and Easter services listed in this magazine and just turn up at church. Now is the time to say to Jesus: "Lord, I have let myself be distracted in a thousand ways, yet here I am once more, to renew my covenant with you.

May we come into Christ's embrace, and grow in His love, so that together, we can walk through the events of Holy Week with Him, and rejoice with Him on the other side! Amen.


Ministry Area Annual Vestry Meeting 2025



The Chosen is Back! 9am, the 1st Saturday of every month, St David's Church, Pencoed





24th April - Mellitus, the Saxon pagans, and St Paul's Cathedral



Our present bishops have big troubles within the Church. Mellitus had big troubles outside the Church.

It all began quietly enough in Rome, where Mellitus was born into a noble family, and became abbot of a monastic community. Then in 601 Pope Gregory the Great sent him to help Augustine, who had arrived in Canterbury in 597.

In 604/5 Augustine consecrated Mellitus to be first Bishop of the East Saxons. Mellitus settled in the capital, Londinium (London), and his wooden cathedral stood on the site of what is now St Paul's.

Mellitus began to evangelise but struggled to make any progress. The Anglo Saxons were very attached to their pagan temples and celebrations. Then Pope Gregory had an inspiration: he told Mellitus not to destroy the pagan temples and banish the pagan feasts. Instead, he should *adapt* them. So, Mellitus simply cleansed the Saxon temples and removed the Saxon idols. He then re-dedicated the buildings to God and re-directed the pagan Saxon feasts towards Christian feast days.

Bede reports that Pope Gregory had reasoned: "If the people are allowed some worldly pleasures ... they will more readily come to desire the joys of the Spirit." The Pope was right – the new approach certainly transformed and spread missionary endeavour throughout the Saxon kingdom.

But then, in 616, Kent and the East Saxons had two new kings. These new rulers reverted to paganism but demanded that Mellitus still give them the Eucharist.

Mellitus refused, was banished, and then fled to Gaul for safety. When it was safe to return, he got as far as Canterbury, where in 619 he was chosen to be the third Archbishop of Canterbury.

We had our transfer for the pascal candle from the Ministry Area. This is a sticky bit of plastic we out on the candle. Mr Mel is buying in bulk to save us all money. This made me think about church candles.

Our use of candles do not come from our elder brothers in faith, the Jews. They did and still do use lights in their worship and whilst the earliest converts to the church were Jewish they did not bring the tradition of lights with them. Surrounded by pagans who used candles in daylight to honour their gods they never used candles as part of worship. As the early theologian Tertullian said,

'Let those who has no light, kindle their lamps every day.'

So no candles for about 300 years. Until the Eastern Church used 'Gospel lights' which were only lit whilst the gospel was read, and extinguished afterwards. This light became a symbol of the truth of the gospel but it reminds me of a tale told by a warden about the number of steps from the nave to the altar. Three – represents the trinity; four? Represents the gospel. When in reality the number of steps was determined by the height difference.

Come the middle ages and an explosion of candles: on altars, in the sanctuary, and before saints. After the death of Henry VIII, the candles before saints were banned. As the Reformation advanced so did the prohibitions, Ash during Ash Wednesday, palms on Palm Sunday, and candles. Especially processional candles.

Candles were banned from Reformation churches, with the exception of those on the altar. They remained in their magnificent candlesticks, but were not allowed to be lit! Such was the Reformation.

Exactly how well these rules were enforced, especially in a very rural church like Llanilid is not known. With the Oxford movement, a Victorian Anglican church group that wanted a more higher church service, candles returned. Though they had crept back slowly in small churches.

One of the strengths of the Anglican Church in Wales is that you can worship in a church that is, as a friend said, 'full of smells and bells' that is high

church, or go low with an almost Puritan feel. All are welcome in the Church in Wales. Most, not all, have candles.

The pascal candle is found in most churches. Lit on Easter Day, and, depending on the church tradition, on every Sunday during the Easter season and maybe other days. Some are pierced with five knobs of incense representing the five wounds of Christ.

Other churches light an advent crown during the season of advent which always reminds me of the BBC TV childrens' programme Blue Peter. They always made one out of coat hangers – guess I am showing my age.

Back to candles. My first visit to Llanild church was to the Carols by Candlelight service that they held, just after Christmas. That was decades ago and I am now part of the Llanilid family, as is everyone who wants to worship with us.

The service is a magical one. The lights are dowsed, the candles flicker, familiar readings and familiar carols. After the excess of Christmas it brings you back to the humility of Christ.

Curiously, after a few incidents with older people and candles – who should have known better – we use battery tea lights. The young people seemed to have respect for a naked flame.

We have a situation that the rabid advisors of the Reformation under Edward VI could not extinguish our candles as efficiently as health and safety.







HOLY WEEK Starts Sunday 13th of April

Holy Week begins with the commemoration of Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, marks the betrayal of Jesus on Spy Wednesday (Holy Wednesday), climaxing with the commemoration of the Mystical or Last Supper on Maundy Thursday and the Passion of Jesus on Good Friday.

HOLY OR SPY WEDNESDAY

In reference to Judas Iscariot's intent to betray Jesus, formed on Holy Wednesday, the day is sometimes called "Spy Wednesday" The word spy, as used in the term, means "ambush, ambuscade, snare". Additionally, among the disciples, Judas clandestinely was a spy and Wednesday was the day he chose to betray Christ.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday is part of Holy Week and is always the last Thursday before Easter. Maundy Thursday is part of the Christian celebration of Easter and marks the night of the Last Supper as told in the Bible. At the Last Supper, Jesus commanded that people should love one another, he then washed the feet of his disciples as an act of humility.

The word Maundy comes from the Latin, 'mandatum', or 'command' which refers to the instructions Jesus gave his disciples at the Last Supper. In many countries the day is known as Holy Thursday and is a public holiday. It is an important day in the Christian calendar and marks the end of Lent, a time for reflection for Christians that follows Shrove Tuesday, or Pancake Day.

To celebrate Maundy Thursday, the Pope - head of the Roman Catholic Church - traditionally washes and kisses the feet of 12 people - usually the members of the church. The washing of the feet of members of the congregation during a Maundy Thursday service by the celebrant has become popular in many Anglican churches in recent years.

The Stripping of the altar, the removing of all ornaments, linens, and paraphernalia from the sanctuary of the church at the end of the Maundy liturgy dates from ancient custom of the Roman rite done on Maundy Thursday. It is symbolic of the humiliation of Jesus at the hands of the soldiers.

WHY IS GOOD FRIDAY CALLED GOOD FRIDAY?

It is the day when Christians commemorate Jesus Christ's crucifixion. So why is it called Good Friday?

According to the Bible, the son of God was flogged, ordered to carry the cross on which he would be crucified and then put to death. It's difficult to see what

is "good" about it. Some sources suggest that the day is "good" in that it is holy, or that the phrase is a corruption of "God's Friday". However, according to Fiona MacPherson, senior editor at the Oxford English Dictionary, (OED) the adjective traditionally "designates a day on (or sometimes a season in) which religious observance is held". OED states that "good" in this context refers to "a day or season observed as holy by the church", hence the greeting "good tide" at Christmas or on Shrove Tuesday. In addition to Good Friday, there is also a less well-known Good or Holy Wednesday, namely the Wednesday before Easter.

The earliest known use of "guode friday" is found in 'The South English Legendary', a text from around 1290, according to the OED. The Catholic Encyclopaedia, first published in 1907, states that the term's origins are not clear. It says some sources see its origins in the term "God's Friday" or Gottes Freitag, while others maintain that it is from the German Gute Freitag. It notes that the day was called Long Friday by the Anglo-Saxons and is referred to as such in modern Danish.

WHY IS EASTER ON A DIFFERENT DATE EACH YEAR?

This year, Easter Sunday will be observed on Sunday, April 20th. This is based on the Gregorian calendar. Easter Sunday always occurs on the first Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon. What is the Paschal Full Moon? The name "paschal" is derived from "Pascha", a transliteration of the Aramaic word meaning Passover. So Easter is specifically the first Sunday following the full Moon that occurs on or after the March or Spring equinox. The equinox being the time of year when the length of day and night are approximately equal everywhere on Earth.

So why does Easter come after the Paschal Full Moon?

Early Christians wanted Easter to coincide with the Jewish Passover, because Christ's death and resurrection happened after the Jewish holiday. Because the Jewish calendar is tied to solar and lunar cycles, the dates of Passover and hence Easter fluctuate each year.
